This guide is intended to provide more information about agencies that the Center for Coalfield Justice may interact with in pursuit of a campaign. Agencies are broken up by campaign at the top of the document but are in alphabetical order below.

Agencies are part of the executive branch of the state government. They operate under the Governor, who appoints the Secretary of each agency and guides their work. Each agency has a specialty and is made up of experts in their respective fields. They write and enforce regulations, educate, perform public outreach, and more to help keep Pennsylvanians informed, safe, happy, and healthy.

The Attorney General is the <u>top law enforcement officer</u> in the state. They investigate and prosecute crimes and represent the Commonwealth in cases brought against it. Their <u>mission</u> is to maintain "the highest standards of ethics to protect life, property, and constitutional and consumer rights, so as to ensure safety and freedom for those living in and visiting the Commonwealth."

While Pennsylvanians have a constitutional right to a clean environment, the Attorney General <u>cannot prosecute</u> individuals or corporations for environmental crimes unless it is referred to them by a county's District Attorney or other state agencies with enforcement authority such as the Department of Environmental Protection, Fish and Boat Commission, and Game Commission.

In the past, the Attorney General has brought <u>charges against CNX Resources</u> for violations of the Air Pollution Control Act in Washington County and <u>against Coterra Energy</u> for contamination of well water in Dimock, Pennsylvania.

DCED is responsible for making Pennsylvania communities and businesses succeed and grow. Their <u>mission</u> is to "encourage the shared prosperity of all Pennsylvanians by supporting good stewardship and sustainable development initiatives across our Commonwealth."

DCED can <u>advise business owners</u> on the best places to open or expand their businesses, workforce development, and financing.

Many state and federal grant and loan programs <u>run through DCED</u>, including programs under the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and Inflation Reduction Act. Examples of programs that DCED runs include the <u>Whole Home Repairs Program</u>, <u>Weatherization</u> <u>Assistance Program</u>, <u>Community Development Block Grants</u>, and the <u>Abandoned Mine</u> <u>Drainage Abatement and Treatment Program</u>.

<u>DCNR is responsible</u> for maintaining, protecting, and managing our state parks and forests. The agency has experts to teach us about ecological and geologic resources and can award <u>grants</u> and technical assistance to benefit our natural resources and recreation. DCNR's mission is "to conserve and sustain Pennsylvania's natural resources for present and future generations' use and enjoyment."

When extraction, such as coal mining or a well pad, threatens a state park, DCNR is likely to get involved. After Duke Lake at Ryerson Station State Park was draining because of the effects of longwall mining, <u>DCNR settled with CONSOL</u> for millions of dollars, which DCNR is now using to improve the park.

DDAP works to reduce drug and alcohol abuse and dependency. Their mission is to "engage, coordinate, and lead [PA's] effort to prevent and reduce drug, alcohol, and gambling addiction and abuse; and to promote recovery, thereby reducing the human and economic impact of the disease."

As part of its mission, DDAP publishes educational sources, like this <u>toolkit</u>, sends representatives to <u>speak or participate in events</u>, distributes harm reduction supplies, has a prescription drug takeback program, and more.

The DEP's <u>mission</u> is to "protect Pennsylvania's air, land, and water from pollution and to provide for the health and safety of its citizens through a cleaner environment." Part of their duty is to enforce Pennsylvania's Environmental Rights Amendment in our State Constitution. <u>Section 127</u> provides that Pennsylvanians, including future generations, "have a right to clean air, pure water, and the preservation of the natural, scenic, historic, and esthetic values of the environment."

DEP is responsible for permitting coal mining and gas extraction, as well as other activities that affect the quality of our environment. The goal of the permitting program is to prevent pollution, but pollution persists. When there are problems with the activities of a permittee, DEP is also responsible for inspections and enforcement. Community members living near infrastructure

can <u>file a complaint</u> with the agency.

DEP also has an <u>Office of Environmental Justice</u>, that is committed to working with communities overburdened with pollution and its effects. This office exists to increase community awareness and involvement in DEP processes during the permitting period. The office also may be helpful if contacted about a complaint through information gathering, sitting in on meetings, etc.

DOH has a <u>vision</u> of a healthy Pennsylvania for all and a mission to "promote healthy behaviors, prevent injury and disease, and to assure the safe delivery of quality health care for all people in Pennsylvania."

An arm of the Department is focused on <u>environmental health</u>. The Division of Environmental Health compiles data, creates resources, connects to stakeholders (including CCJ), and consults on environmental concerns. DOH <u>will also review test results</u> from the Department of Environmental Protection or other state-accredited labs and interpret them to determine potential health impacts.

In the past, DOH has also commissioned studies, such as the <u>PA Health and Environment Study</u> on the relationship between unconventional natural gas development and asthma, childhood cancer, and birth outcomes.

The Department of Labor and Industry <u>focuses on</u> Pennsylvania's workforce and workforce and economic development. They provide services directly to employees through the administration of unemployment benefits and workers' compensation, job training, the enforcement of workplace safety standards and laws, and runs a community service program for young people.

The Department also <u>"promotes economic development and an improved business climate,"</u> and therefore may play a very important role in a just transition away from fossil fuels and an economy based on the fossil fuel industry. They consult on <u>workforce development</u>, <u>administer</u> grants, and more.

Their website contains useful information and reports on these topics. The department is also responsible for registering and licensing businesses and health professionals.

DOS works under the mission to "promote the integrity of the electoral process, provide the initial infrastructure for economic development through corporate organizations and transactions, and protect the health and safety of the public."

PennDOT has a hand in <u>all things transportation</u> in Pennsylvania. Its mission is to "enhance, connect, and add value to our communities by providing a sustainable, equitable transportation system and quality services for all" They run programs affecting highways, public transportation, airports, railroads, ports, and waterways and an emission inspection program.

When an activity such as coal mining affects a road, PennDOT will have a plan. For example, the

department has a multiphase <u>monitoring and maintenance plan</u> in place for longwall mining under Interstates 70 and 79 in Washington and Greene Counties.

The <u>Fish and Boat Commission</u> user-funded agency (receiving no general fund assistance from the State) with a mission "to protect, conserve, and enhance the Commonwealth's aquatic resources and provide fishing and boating opportunities."

The agency's responsibilities include hatching fish and stocking our streams in the spring, issuing fishing and boating licenses, conservation of habitats, and education. Fish and Boat also runs several <u>grant programs</u> in pursuit of their mission.

There are <u>several streams and lakes</u> in Washington and Greene County that are stocked by Fish and Boat or have boat access. In addition, Fish and Boat <u>owns</u> Canonsburg Lake and Dutch Fork Lake in Washington County.

The Game Commission works under a <u>mission</u> to "manage and protect wildlife and their habitats while promoting hunting and trapping for current and future generations." To reach the goals of its mission, the Commission <u>owns and manages over 1.5 million acres</u> of game lands throughout the state. If an operator wanted to extract resources from these lands, they would negotiate with the Game Commission. It would be the same if there were damages to the property as a result of the extraction.

The PUC <u>oversees</u> all the entities that provide utility services in Pennsylvania, including electricity, gas, pipeline transmission of gas and other hazardous materials, water and wastewater collection and disposal and more. The agency does this to further their mission of "balanc[ing] the needs of consumers and utilities; ensur[ing] safe and reliable utility service at reasonable rates; protect[ing] the public interest; education[ing] consumers to make independent and informed utility choices; further[ing] economic development; and foster[ing] new technologies and competitive markets in an environmentally sound manner" PUC also administers the <u>AEPS Act</u> and <u>Act 13 Impact Fees</u>.
